The book is influential in the theory of international relations to establish three images of analysis used to explain conflicts in the international system. [1] Three images of Waltz's initial contribution to Waltz's international relations were his 1959 book Man, State and War, which classified theories causes of war into three categories, or levels of analysis. [2] Valls refers to these levels of analysis as images and uses works by one or another classical political philosopher to outline the highlights of each image. Each image is given two sections: the first uses mostly works by a classical philosopher to describe what this image suggests about the cause of the war, and the second usually features Valls analyzing the strengths and weaknesses of this image. First image: Individuals First image argues that wars are often caused by the character of specific statesmen and political leaders, such as the leaders of states such as Napoleon or Saddam Hussein, or human nature in general. This is largely consistent with classical realism, which then dominated international relations, but will be discussed by Valls more fully in his next book The Theory of International Politics. Second image: States of War Theory, which fall under the heading of the second image of Waltz, claim that wars are caused by the internal makeup of states. A prime example cited by Valls is Lenin's theory of imperialism, which posits that the root cause of war is rooted in the need for capitalist states to continue to open up new markets to perpetuate their economic system at home. A more familiar example in the Western world today is the notion that undemocratic states, because of their internal composition, are starting wars. Third image: The international Valls system next rates the first two images as less influential overall than the third image, but is ultimately needed in understanding the causes of the war. Valls completes his 1959 book Man, State, and War with a definitive explanation of the three images. The third image describes the framework of world politics and the first and second insults, defining the forces that create the policy of the state. The third image posits that the cause of the war is at a systemic level: namely, that the anarchic structure of the international system is the cause of war. In this context, anarchy is defined not as a condition of chaos or disorder, but as one in which there is no sovereign body governing interaction between autonomous nation states. In other words, unlike domestic society, in which citizens could theoretically rely on law enforcement to protect their individuals and property if the state invaded and calls 911, it cannot be sure that someone will respond. Similarly, when two citizens have a dispute, they can apply to the courts for sentencing and, more importantly, law enforcement to enforce the court's ruling, but there is no authority over nation states that is able to establish rules or laws for all states, deciding how they apply in specific cases, and forcing states to honor the court's ruling. As a consequence, if the issue is at stake is important enough for the state, it can achieve a satisfactory result only by using its power to impose its will on another state. the realization that at any given time any state can resort to the armed forces, makes every state always be prepared for this unforeseen. These themes are more fully drawn out in the theory of international politics, which, as the name suggests, lays out the theory of international politics in general, rather than a vuzher emphasis on what causes war.
